For over three decades, Coach McCarthy has been a guiding force for the Sailors' cross country and track programs. A Scituate alumna and standout runner in her own right, McCarthy has dedicated her life to coaching, teaching physical education, and inspiring the next generation of student-athletes to strive for greatness—not just in sports, but in life.
